Not this day or the next

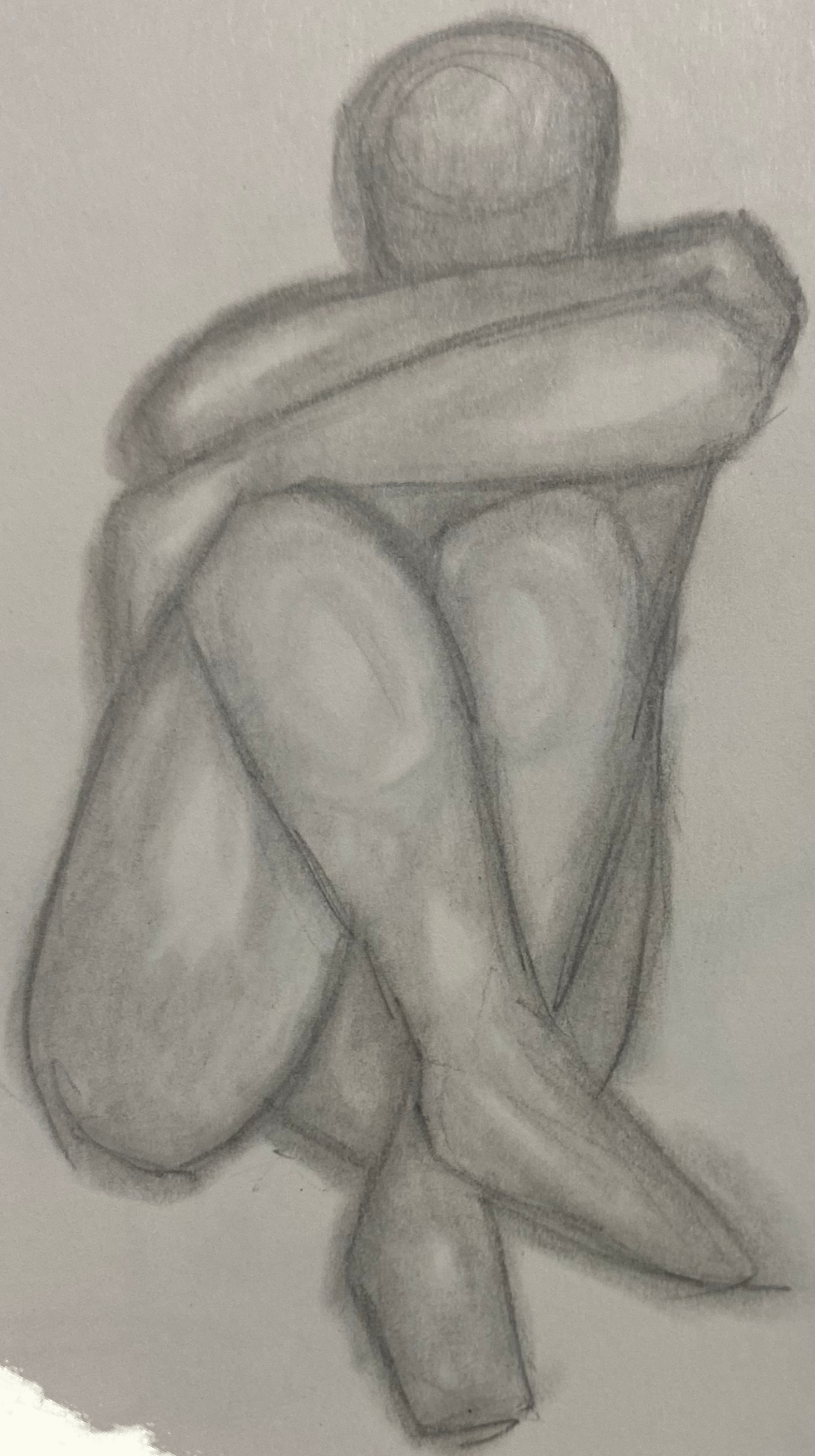
You'll find your hue
